
An analysis of food shopping in Brexit Britain, using official data

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
This is not all because of recent food price inflation

This increase in the value of food shopping cannot be attributed to recent food price inflation, as it has been happening over the last six years — well before the recent hikes in prices. Nevertheless, we should state that inflation is clearly one factor in all of this.
